The STP Resets

All leaders are agreed that the Sustainability and Transformation Partnership must continue the strong focus on delivering high quality, sustainable services within each 'place' – Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West. **Together their collective focus will be** to:

- Make sure learning is shared between health and care systems for the collective benefit of the STP and the communities it serves
- Collaborate and plan when more can be achieved on a larger scale, including working with neighbouring STPs when work programmes straddle STP boundaries
- Demonstrate the tangible benefits the partnership brings to delivering health and care and improving health and wellbeing
- Provide the required assurance to NHS England on progress with implementing the *Five Year Forward View*

£7.5m Funding Boost for Local Health and Care Records

STPs and Integrated Care Systems in the Thames Valley, Surrey, and Bedfordshire have been awarded £7.5m funding by NHS England to become a Local Health and Care Record Exemplar (LHCRE). The success comes from a joint bid by BOB STP, Surrey Heartlands Health and Care Partnership, Frimley Health and Care and Bedfordshire, Luton and Milton Keynes STP.

The role of the Thames Valley and Surrey LHCRE is to create an integrated, electronically shared local health and care record across the patch over the next two years. The project will bring a number of benefits to staff and patients. For example, staff will be able to access information from patient histories to previous test results and care plans. At the moment, GPs and other care professionals are often not able to access crucial patient information quickly if it is held in another part of the health service. Patients will see the benefit of this sharing of information by not having to provide the same information each time they are seen by a different part of the NHS or social care.

STP Bids to Transform Estates

Partners within BOB STP have come together to prioritise key estates schemes that would benefit from NHS England transformation funding.

The STP has submitted a total of seven bids for a range of proposals that will help bring services closer to home and provide modern facilities to support improved care. NHS England is running a process with STPs, asking them to identify and prioritise projects in line with their estates strategies.

The BOB STP funding bids include Tier 4 Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS), accommodation suitable for adults with learning disabilities and a joint scheme with Frimley STP's Integrated Care Hub to bring outpatient services out of hospital and deliver them closer to where patients live.
